## I don't watch TV anymore! Teaching Notes

Target Structure:Conversation, Vocabulary BuildingVocabulary:GeneralLevel:Lower-IntermediateTime:45 minutesPreparation:None

#### **Suggested Teaching Method**

This worksheet will help your lower-intermediate students work on common vocabulary and expressions. They will also practise talking about changes, using 'used to', 'nowadays' and 'anymore'.

- Assign pairs and give out one worksheet to each student. Students can discuss the opening question. Elicit some feedback. Don't spend too long here, as there are discussion questions at the end of the worksheet.
- Set the scene. Pre-teach vocabulary as you deem necessary. Pay particular attention to the words below the conversation. Students should read the conversation and fill in the blanks. Have them practise the conversation several times with a partner.
- Students can work in pairs. Go though the answers with the group.
- Students can work alone. They should try not to refer to the original conversation.
- Again, students can work alone and then check in pairs.
- Present the target language. Give an example answer for the first sentence. Students can then write their own sentences, and compare their answers with a partner.

When finished, elicit some answers.

Leave plenty of time for class discussion. To maximise student talking time, it's best to put students in pairs, or small groups. Students should read all the questions first, before beginning the discussion.

While the students are speaking, monitor the conversations, but try not to interrupt. When the discussion comes to a close, ask a few of the questions yourself, and go through any points of English you made a note of while monitoring.
