The USA is a country on the North American continent that is made up of fifty states. The national flag has thirteen stripes and fifty white stars on a blue background. The thirteen stripes refer to the thirteen British colonies that declared independence from the kingdom of Great Britain in 1776 and the fifty stars refer to the fifty states.

The USA shares borders with Canada and Mexico. The border shared with Canada is the longest international border in the world. It is 8,891 kilometers long.



The USA is the third most populated country in the world after China and India and has a population of 332 million. The largest city in the USA is New York with about 8.46 million residents.

The highest mountain in the USA is Mount Denali. It is 6,190 meters high and it is located in Alaska. The longest river in the USA is the Missouri River and it is 3,767 kilometers long. It flows through seven states.

Disneyland saw 80% fewer visitors in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but now, Disneyland has an average of 51,000 visitors every day.

Overview:	Students learn about and practice asking and answering 'how' questions through a discussion based activity about the USA and a series of communicative exercises.		

#### 1. DISCUSS

#### 3. HOW QUESTIONS

- A. In pairs or as a class, students read about constructing object and subject questions with 'how'. Answer any questions that arise. You might choose to board examples and discuss the differences between the two types of questions. Most questions in English are object questions – we want to know about the receiver of the action. These questions follow the QUASM formula: Question word – Auxiliary verb – Subject – Main verb. However, sometimes we want to ask about the subject. We don't know the person or thing who performed the action, and we want to find out. This type of question is called a subject question. Subject questions do NOT use the auxiliary verbs do, does, and did.
- B. Check students' understanding of the words: duration, length, amount, price, quantity, and frequency.

Individually or in pairs, students complete the questions with the correct 'how' expressions then match them with their functions. Students can compare their answers with a partner and discuss any differences or check answers as a class.
