Visiting Someone's House: Teaching Notes

Target Structure:	Social English
Vocabulary:	General
Level:	Lower-Intermediate +
Time:	45 minutes
Preparation:	None

Suggested Teaching Method

- Begin by setting the scene. Assign pairs, and give each pair a set of conversation strips to put in the right order. When finished, they can check their answers against the conversation in part two.
- Follow the instructions. Students should first read the conversation, and then practice in pairs. Encourage the students to look up and make eye contact with each other when speaking.
- Students can cover the original conversation for this exercise. Direct their attention to the scrambled sentences. Elicit the answer to one from a confident student before allowing your class to begin the exercise. They should write the unscrambled sentences in the box below.

Students should check with a partner. Go through the answers with the group and check comprehension.

- Demonstrate the substitution drills with a confident student. Encourage students to look up when speaking and use their ideas as well as the suggestions.
- **6** Students can work alone and check in pairs.
- **7** Demonstrate with a confident student.

Assign new pairs. Students can switch roles each time.

B Demonstrate the activity with a student. Encourage some theatrics – such as ringing the doorbell, and miming taking off a hat, or passing an umbrella.

Students should speak to as many of their classmates as possible, switching roles regularly.

Monitor, but try not to interrupt. When the activity draws to a close, write on the board some errors you made a note of, and elicit correction.
