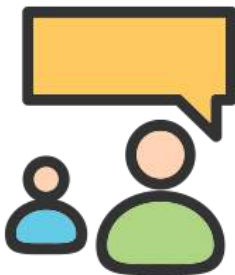

# What do you think of driverless cars?

## Teaching Notes

<b>Target Structures:</b>	N/A (Reading, Speaking, Vocabulary)
<b>Vocabulary:</b>	General
<b>Level:</b>	Upper Elementary / Lower Intermediate
<b>Time:</b>	One Hour +
<b>Preparation:</b>	Make one copy for each student

### Suggested Teaching Method:

**Do your students like the idea of driverless cars? Are computer-drivers reliable?**

**This worksheet has a lower-level reading, with comprehension and vocabulary building exercises, followed by simple discussion.**

- 1 Before distributing the worksheets, you could write 'driverless cars' on the board and have students speculate on the meaning. Elicit feedback.

Distribute one set of worksheets to each student. Drill students on the pronunciation of the words in the left-hand column, paying particular attention to the stress. Students can work in pairs matching the words to the definitions. Go through the answers with the group.

- 2 Direct your students' attention to the words beneath the reading passage.

Students should work alone, and read the text at a brisk pace, filling in the spaces. Encourage them to underline any parts that are unclear, and move on, rather than consult dictionaries.

Students can check their answers with a partner. Go through the answers with the group.

- 3 Students can work in pairs, asking and answering the questions with a partner. Go through the answers with the group.

- 4 Students can work alone and then check their answers in pairs.

- 5 This exercise gives your students the opportunity to personalize the language. Assign new pairs or groups of three. Have students read through the questions before beginning. Answer any vocabulary questions.

You could set these questions as homework. Have students write a sentence or two for each answer.

Students can discuss the topics in their groups. Monitor and make notes. Encourage students to use the language in bold in their answers.

- 6 Reassign groups. Students should again read all the questions first, before beginning the discussion.

Encourage eye contact and follow-up questions.

While the students are speaking, monitor the conversations, but try not to interrupt. When the discussion comes to a close, ask a few of the questions yourself, and go through any points of English you made a note of while monitoring.
